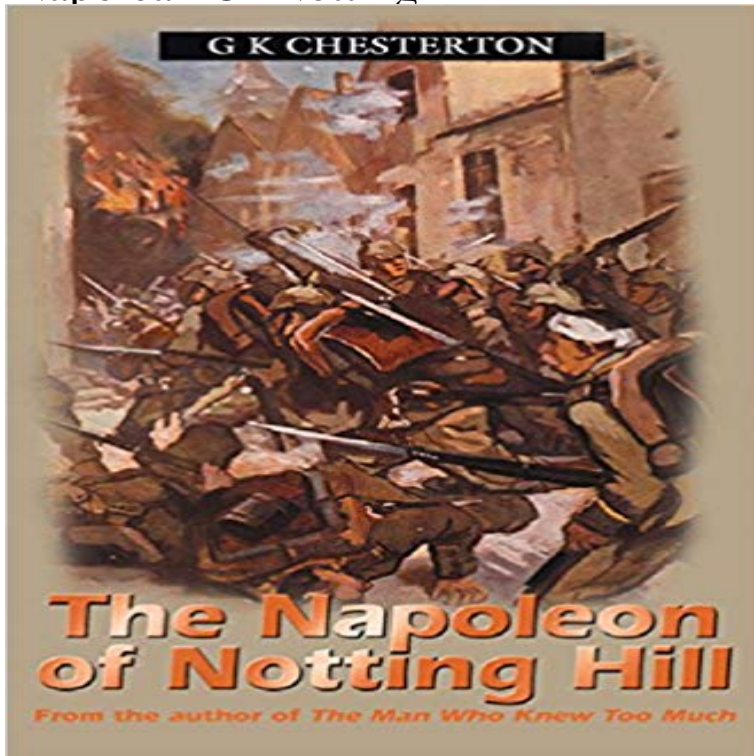


## Napoleon Of Notting Hill
